

# 4-H Award System & Rules

The purpose of 4-H awards is to recognize achievement in a 4-H project area. A 4-H project has a piece of specific curriculum or an individual topic expert (e.g. a veterinarian) attached to it and takes place over a long period of time (6 hours or more). It should be designed with sequential learning experiences (over a period of at least a few days or few weeks) exploring a general subject with the guidance of a project leader or mentor.

### To receive 4-H project awards 4-H members must:

- 1. Complete a 4-H Member Record.
- 2. Complete a 4-H Project Record for each project for which they would like recognition with clear documentation of project work.
- 3. Fill out the Vermont 4-H Achievement Application.
- 4. Have leader recommendation and Educator approval.
- 5. Be a member in good standing. (Attend at least 75% of their club's business meetings, attend at least 75% of applicable project meetings, and keep member and project record books).

## Levels of Recognition and Specific Requirements

## **Certificate of Participation**

Complete 6-8 hours of various, sequential project related activities.

#### Certificate of Excellence

- Complete more than 8 hours of various, sequential project related activities.
- Developing and conducting a visual or verbal presentation that shares project skills, knowledge, or information with an audience beyond your club level. Examples of presentations: speeches/talks, action exhibits, demonstrations, radio shows, fashion review, T.V. shows, power points, websites, posters, table top displays, videos, stage performances. <u>A presentation may only count for recognition once and for only one project area.</u>

### **Medal** (limited to three per youth per year)

- Have previously received a Certificate of Excellence in the project area.
- Meet the requirements for certificate of excellence (again).
- Complete at least 2 years in a 4-H project,-demonstrate successful educational progression, and show project accomplishment.
- Participate in a project area learning experience beyond the club project group meetings and activities. Examples of learning experiences beyond the club level: trainings, workshops, classes, clinics, livestock shows, project knowledge or skill contests. <u>A learning experience may only count for recognition for one project area.</u>

**Certificate of Continued Achievement**: After a 4-H member receives a medal in a project, they may receive a Certificate of Continued Achievement if they choose to continue to participate in that project at a level equal to medal recognition, as listed above.
