The opportunity to choreograph a 15 minute original piece? Theresa did what any dance lover would do. She hid out in the library, researching her

choreography idols (Blankenbuehler, Fosse, Jones, Bennett, etc.). Each choreographer had their own unique creating process and movement style. She took advantage of these past three months to find her own. Each piece uses a different combination of these resources, ending with what she feels is her own method. The piece follows a chronological journey through college: a microscopic view on proper technique, the naivete of young adult performers, high expectations, conforming to standards, rebelling against procedures, and finding authenticity. Overall, she wants to spread her passion for musical theater with audiences, through this piece and all others.

Senior Capstone Projects completed outside this performance:

The Thanksgiving Play Lighting Design by Wren Dumais

For their capstone project, Wren designed lighting for *The Thanksgiving Play* by Larissa FastHorse here at UVM. The show takes place in a very "woke" classroom with scenes in between being "mini-shows" from different age ranges. Teachers trying to figure out how to respectfully and accurately put on a Thanksgiving play quickly realize that this is not going to be as easy as they thought. Wren utilized real world classrooms and experiences to help portray the openness and welcoming energy of the characters. They also used color theory to create a stark opposition in the interstitial scenes that demonstrated the racism surrounding the teaching of Thanksgiving traditions. Each skit was lit differently based on the content, the genre, how we as a creative team envisioned it to look in its original form. Because all of these skits were based on real theatrical pieces, they tried to create a lighting environment as authentic as possible.

Spirits to Enforce Lighting Design by Trevor Gould

For his senior capstone, Trevor designed lighting for *Spirits to Enforce*, a wonderful play about the role that theatre has in all of our lives, even for superheroes. In his design, he explored the constant nature of flux and how the collaborative aspect of theatre is integral to the production itself. The play was centered around a team of superheroes making cold calls in a submarine at the bottom of a lake in an attempt to fundraise for a production of *The Tempest* by William Shakespeare. In the design, Trevor utilized aspects of movement and sterility in the lighting to create an atmosphere of sterility and desperation. The "big reveal" was by far his favorite part as it combined the aspects of the sound design, by friend Pat Boll, and scenic design, by the wonderful and ever graceful Professor Sara Nelson. Through the use of flickering lights and some outside the play and had a dramatic backdrop for the climax of the play, when the characters truly came to life in three different ways, a superhero, an

everyday individual, and finally as their true character in *The Tempest*. Trevor is so happy with how the design turned out and could not be thankful enough for the creative team that had his back through all of the ebbs and flows of the creative process.

4 Years of Stage Management by Acadia Johnson

Acadia came into UVM undecided on my major. Still, she found herself waiting to talk to Sara Nelson after an Intro to Theater class to see how she could get involved in the department in any way, shape, or form. Before Acadia's first semester was up, she had declared a Theatre Major and stage managed *It's A Wonderful Life*. Acadia got the bug for stage management and it hasn't gone away. For her senior capstone she stage managed *Spirits to Enforce* in the Fall of 2024. This role taught Acadia a great deal about self, the art form, and the community. Acadia is extremely grateful for both of these shows and all those in between. From rehearsal reports, to scheduling fittings, to calling cues, she would not be who she is today without these opportunities.

Arts Integration in Elementary Classrooms by Georgia Malone-Wolfson

Last year, Georgia took an education course at UVM with Alexia Buono that explored integrating art into the classroom. It reignited her passion for working with kids and this past semester, she student- taught at a local artsintegrated elementary school, investigating the impact of art in education.
